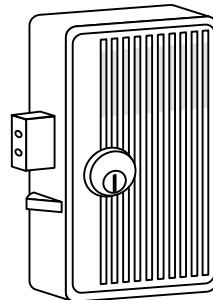
Anti-Pilferage Exit Devices Meet Fire Codes and Help Reduce Employee Theft

Two Styles Meet Different Needs

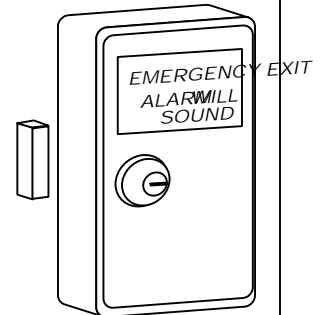
One type of anti-pilferage lock includes a full panic bar, a deadbolt and battery operated exit alarm. Many national retail chains use these

7 TIPS TO INCREASE HOME SECURITY

- Ⓔ Demand identification from anyone who requests entry to your home, including service people and police officers.
- Replace hollow-core exterior doors with solid wood or insulated metal doors.
- ⌘ Install low-voltage exterior lights connected to a motion detector.
- Post easily read house numbers that are clearly visible for identification by emergency vehicles.
- Be involved in your local neighborhood watch program.
- Install doors with inside hinges or security hinges, so the hinge-pins cannot be removed from the outside.
- Engrave your property with personal identification numbers.
